The library also hosted two Lego Clubs in March – one on the school's early dismissal day and the second during spring break. We had a Story Hour and seed planting activity during spring break as well. Overall, we had good attendance for the Lego Clubs although Story Hour only attracted two children and their parents who still had fun planting sunflower seeds. Four members of the book club also met in March.

We have been awarded a \$25,000 grant through the Manitoba Government's Arts, Culture and Sport in Community Fund Small Capital and Special Initiatives Program. With the fundraising we have already done this will allow us to upgrade the flooring, a new coat of paint, replace the circulation desk and provide an outside book drop for patrons. These upgrades will enhance our ability to better serve our patrons by allowing us to reorganize our space, provide new seating areas and give patrons the ability to return books outside of library opening hours.

We anticipate these improvements will be made in April/early May.

Miami branch is happy to announce that we're officially the recipients of a \$12,000 grant from the Arts, Culture and Sport in Community (ACSC) Fund! We are looking forward to starting the work in improving our checkout desk, adding storage, replacing our filing cabinet-turned-book drop, and adding space to our clerk area, just to name a few projects.

In March we hosted a book club night for The Firekeepers Daughter and introduced our next book, The Midnight Library for April. We had four people attend the meeting and had more patrons who chose to read the book on their own. We are slowly gaining more interest and the word seems to be spreading as we have consistent enquiries about the club. Our Lego club's second night took place in March. We unfortunately had no patrons show up, though our first night had five kids. We hope numbers rise as we continue the club throughout the year.

We had a story time and craft session for 5 weeks (in place of Acorns to Oaks). This way we were able to open the story time up to anyone without registration and on a drop-in basis. We had a local volunteer help run the event each week, and our last session takes place April 12th. So far, it's been a big success, even with slightly less numbers than the last run we did. During spring break, we also had a perler bead session and a few kids showed up to that as well.

We look forward to hosting a planting/seed event in collaboration with our local horticulture group in the spring, as well as preparing all our Bookland Explorers décor to start going up in May.
