In total for all South Central's 5 branches, we had 1337 program registrations and a total of 24.935 hours read overall. For anyone curious, the squishmallow prizes were by far the most popular prize and took both 1st and 2nd place for most tickets entered. I will be compiling a more comprehensive list to share with more in depth stats from the summer. Thanks to the support of the Green Team funding for allowing us to hire exceptional students for the summer.

This year Winkler launched a pilot project for a teen program at the end of July and it was also very successful. In the short time the program ran, we had 25 participants and a total of 946 hours read. We had great feedback regarding this program and hope to continue this next year, in Winkler and other branches.

Our theme for next year is 'Under The Sea', and Joanna and I have already started shopping!

Winkler Branch Administrator's Report – submitted by Jess Martens

Summer was VERY busy in the Winkler Branch. We had 582 kids participate in the Bookland Explorers program and they read over 12,121 hours. We also ran 27 workshops and story times and had 652 kids attend.

As part of the summer program, we also attended the Harvest Festival and had 391 people stop by the tent. The last two years we have shared a tent with the Winkler Arts and Culture Centre but next year the plan is to have our own booth set up as a rest/craft area. For our Bookland Explorers windup we had a movie night and showed the movie Lightyear and had 85 people attend. NOTE: Over the course of the summer, we spent \$0.11 cents per child on workshops. This is not sustainable, and we were lucky we had craft materials leftover from previous programs.

Our summer teen program also had 25 participants and they read 946 hours. We are hoping to run the program again next year and add a few events for the teens.

E. Reimer, and Nikki Kroetsch Bertresser were local authors who visited and the patrons enjoyed being able to ask the authors about their writing process.

There were three Bookmobile visits, we went to Schanzenfeld twice and Plum Coulee once. It was well received and next summer we are planning to start the Bookmobile earlier in the summer.

Our fundraising raffle went well, and we raised \$1242 for the reading garden. Unfortunately, our reading garden was vandalized, and the fence lattice was pushed out, one of our tables had initials burnt into it and our cushions were stolen and later found in the park bathrooms. Fortunately, I was able to fix the damage and the people responsible have been apprehended. One of them came in to apologize and will be helping us prep the garden for winter this fall. Support from the community was immediate.

Kenton Dyck, a local resident, recently purchased a large telescope and is enthusiastic about community programming. We have held two events so far. One was a demonstration at the library of how a telescope works with 37 people attending. The 2nd viewing was of the August super blue moon and the rings of Saturn at the Emerado School playground with over 100 in attendance. We are planning more events in the coming months at the Emerado School, and we are hoping to use their warming hut at the rink so we can continue to observe celestial events in winter. I will also be reaching out to the schools and sending them the astronomy info since it is such a unique opportunity.

The final program we had this month was an after-hours Nerf battle at the library. We had 12 people attend and they had a great time. One of the parents had previous experience with similar programs and has generously volunteered his time so we are going to make Nerf battles at the library a monthly event.

In September we are starting registration for our fall preschool story time session so we will be preparing crafts for that. Lego club continues to grow in popularity on early dismissal days. We're hoping to add an additional Saturday each month for Lego club in the new year.

Books & Brew will be continuing in fall, and we'll be meeting the last Thursday of every month. We have decided to cancel our Yarn with Friends as a month program and instead will be focusing on events. Currently we are planning a series of huck weaving workshops for September/October and are hoping to hold a crochet-athon to make lap blankets for Eden Mental Health in January. I will be starting to plan a book sale for November. We are hoping to hold it at Winkler Arts and Culture since they have a larger space and have a combined book and art sale. There is a lot of programming coming up, but we are excited about it.
