After a busy October of programs, we took a break from programing, but our Book Club met on November 1 with five members attending. We also had to have some electrical wiring around to accommodate the new floor plan and replace some lighting. We continue to get compliments from the public on the changes out on the floor.

November flew by. This month we collected pajamas, toiletries etc. for Genesis House's Power of Pj's program and we had a record amount of donations. People were very generous. We also did Fines for Food where all the fines paid for a week go to people in need. We collected \$249 between fines paid and patron donations. During the last week of November, we had Ten Thousand Villages rent the meeting room for their pop-up Christmas store. By all accounts it went quite well, and they sold a fair amount. Having them in for a week seemed to work a bit better than the two and a half months they've rented the room for in the past. People seemed make it a bit more of a priority for their holiday shopping. Also, with the amount of programming we are doing, working around the meeting room being unavailable for a week is fine but we can't stop programming for two and a half months. If they are interested in renting the room again next year for a week, we would be open to it. Our regular programming did well, and people are enjoying the Monday Nerf battles since it doesn't conflict with the youth groups and other programs that usually take place on Wednesdays. We also held a woven Christmas ornament workshop which was very popular.

In December we have a few Christmas programs planned. We are holding an ugly Christmas sweater workshop, a Christmas Cookie decorating night and a Christmas story time evening. Our Cookbook Club theme for the month is also Christmas treats, so it will be a very festive month. Our book club is taking a break for the month since most people will be busy with holiday events and the usual meeting day falls on Boxing Day. On December 10th we are holding our patron appreciation day with apple cider and cookies will be available all day. It's going to be a fun month and hopefully the weather stays nice.
